



Remember that your child can apply for permanent residency before turning 19 years old.

Information on Obtaining Permanent Residency and Danish Citizenship

Many young people who live permanently in Denmark but do not have a Danish passport can apply for what is called permanent residency. Permanent residency is a prerequisite for obtaining Danish citizenship and a Danish passport later on.

It is important to know that failing to apply between the ages of 18 and 19 could affect your child's ability to obtain permanent residency. Additionally, interruptions in education or full-time work after the 9th and 10th grade may have consequences. The City of Copenhagen is therefore sending this letter to you and your child as a reminder to familiarise yourselves with the rules and to apply in a timely manner.

Permanent residency

There are more lenient conditions for obtaining permanent residency if you remember to apply between the ages of 18 and 19. [You can read about the rules for applying for permanent residency here.](#) Please note that the application can be submitted as early as three months before your child turns 18 and up to one day before he or she turns 19.

Danish citizenship

After obtaining permanent residency, you can apply for Danish citizenship. It is important to know that applicants must, among other things, meet [employment](#) requirements and must not have committed [certain types of criminal offences](#). For instance, it is generally not possible to obtain Danish citizenship if the applicant has been sentenced to imprisonment. You can read more about the rules for applying for citizenship [here](#).
